

INSARAG Team Leaders Meeting Summary 2017 DRAFT v 25 10

18-20 October Bali, Indonesia

Meeting Overview

More than 170 participants from over 56 countries and organisations working on urban search and rescue (USAR) gathered for the annual International Search and Rescue Advisory Group (INSARAG) Team Leaders Meeting in Bali, Indonesia from 18-20 October 2017 (Participants list in **Annex A**).

This meeting was hosted by the BASARNAS Indonesia – the national Search and Rescue Agency of Indonesia and co-organised by Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) in its capacity as the INSARAG Secretariat located within the Field Coordination Support Section (FCSS) in the Emergency Services Branch (ESB) of OCHA Geneva. The Bali Governor, and National disaster management authorities BNPB, the Armed Forces TNI of Indonesia and OCHA Indonesia supported and participated in the meeting.

Summary of Presentations and Discussions

Official Opening

Mr. E Mader Mangku Pastika, the Governor of Bali and Brig Gen Ivan Ahamad Rizki Titus, Director of Operations of BASARNAS, warmly welcomed the INSARAG Team Leader's Meeting 2017 participants to Bali and outlined the important work of INSARAG in preparedness and response. Mr E Mander further reassured everyone on the situation of the Mount Agung volcano, and that the authorities are on top of the situation and have in place comprehensive contingency plans for evacuation should a major eruption take place.

Mr Oliver Lacey-Hall, Head of OCHA Indonesia, thanked the Government of Indonesia for hosting this important meeting and shared and outlined INSARAG's significant position as a model in the humanitarian response community with agreed quality standards for USAR response. He also highlighted the key issues that team leaders will be consulted on in the 3 day meeting.

Mr. Yudi from BASARNAS facilitated the introduction of all the participants, and the agenda for the Team Leaders meeting was adopted (Meeting Agenda in **Annex B**).

1. INSARAG in 2017 -18

Mr. Chang, from FCSS, OCHA Geneva and representing the INSARAG Secretariat, updated the meeting on work done at the global level and reporting back and strategic directions from the ISG.

2. Update from Working Groups Chairs- Work done

The 5 working group chairs of Training, Medical, KoBo, various working groups

- i. Training Working Group (TWG) Mr. Dewey Perks, from the United States and Chair of the Training Working Group (TWG), updated the activities of the TWG. The TWG have completed the extensive work on USAR Coordination and have supported the first ToT in all regions and individual courses hosted by Member States. Teams have to take ownership and seek regional and global support as necessary, to have members trained in the UC system.
- ii. Medical Working Group (MWG) Dr. Anthony Macintyre, from the United States and the Chair of the Medical Working Group (MWG), updated their activities and stressed on the close work and collaboration with the WHO and on the paper endorsed at the ISG on USAR Medicine, while several ongoing elements on USAR medical response, are being discussed with WHO and to find common synergies for effective response.
- iii. Light Teams Working Group (LTWG) Mr. Arjan Stam, from the Netherlands and the Chair of the Light Team Working Group (LTWG), updated the ongoing discussions among the LTWG. While the technical concept has been endorsed by the ISG, they are not tasked to recommend various options for this and will consult with the TL during the breakouts.
- iv. KoBo WG- Mr. Peter Wolff, aka Mr Kobo, from THW Germany, provided an update on the trial results from KoBo Toolbox in recent INSARAG earthquake exercises The link to KoBo Toolbox is now added in the

Virtual OSOCC discussions when responding to disasters, and the data collected by KoBo will be available at Humanitarian Data Exchange (HDX). KoBo will continue to be tested and practised at the INSARAG Exercises and UCC courses. INSARAG teams are strongly encouraged to test the tool in trainings and

exercises. The KWG supported by the TL participants recommended a name change to the group, as the emlement of Information Management (IM) is more the focus, than limiting it to just one tool i.e. Kobo, while there are various data collection mechanisms to support the IM work of the UCC.

v. Guidelines Review Group (GRG- Transition Team) -Mr. David Sochor from Switzerland, on behalf of Ambassador Manuel Bessler, the Chair of the Guidelines Review Group (GRG) and the INSARAG Global Chair, introduced the activities of the "transitional" GRG 2015-2018. Discussions are ongoing regarding the arrangements for the new team for the GRG to work on the revisions for 2018-2020. A co-chair model has been proposed at the AP regional meeting and a proposal requesting some of the members from the last GRG meeting be invited back, to ensure institutional knowledge and experience are brought back to the new GRG group in 2018-2020.

3. **Presentation: National Response - As Local as Possible. Lessons from Italy** by Lt Col Stefania Fiore, Vigili del Fuoco, Italian Civil Protection shared the key lessons on their national response to the massive earthquakes in central Italy and avalanche disasters in Italy, and how the Italian authorities are now closely engaging with INSARAG to share their experiences and also prepare their Heavy team for IEC in late 2018.

4. Break-out discussions – Round 1

Mr. Russel Turner from the Training Working Group and from Australia, moderated the break out discussion topics and facilitators from the working groups and the INSARAG network.

The four break out discussions were organised as listed below. All the participants were divided into 4 groups, and the groups rotated covering all the four topics:

- Discussion 1: IER Pre-Greening Arrangements (Tsukasa Katsube, Jacob Bolwinkel)
- Discussion 2: Technical Guidelines Reference Library (Paul Burns, Peter Wolff)
- Discussion 3: Light teams (Arjan Stam, Christian Baroux, Brad Commens)
- Discussion 4: National Accreditation Process (Sebastian Mocarquer, Peter Goxharaj)

The summary of the discussions are in <u>Annex C</u>.

- 5. Plenary Discussion: UC and KoBo 01 JAN 2018 implementation and IEC/R requirements Dewey Perks, Peter Wolff, and the meeting discussed and proposed the following:
- a) Importance of information management (data collection, analysis and visualization) was highlighted as well as the use of information for a broader response (e.g. humanitarian assistance).
- b) Some participants expressed their hesitation about the timeframe of KoBo implementation, especially with regards to the teams preparing for IERs in 2018. On the response, will the INSARAG community be ready in two months to implement it in an emergency setting? It was proposed to wait for the final version and then to put it into implementation.
- c) There is no need to wait for a perfect system, it should be good enough to start and the potential changes can be reflected during revisions and update as the guidelines is a living document.
- d) A draft SOP on KoBo and a document on what KoBo is what it is used for will be finalized in four weeks.
- e) To demystify KoBo it was suggested to conduct the final testing both on collection and analysis side, hold a workshop and test the data collection at a simulation exercise.
- f) Necessity to embrace change was acknowledged, participation in dedicated training courses and Earthquake Response Exercise was proposed.
- 6. **Plenary discussion: Quality Assurance and INSARAG -** Facilitated by Team Leader representatives Arjan Stam and Paul Burns, moderated by Annika Coll, and the meeting discussed and proposed the following:

- a) Criticality of quality control especially of missions was noted, the mission reports and lessons learned reports should be utilized and best practices as well as short comings should be shared at different forums and events including TLs' meetings.
- b) Each IEC/R should have a report on good practices and areas for improvement, the classifiers TL should have a dedicated session on the report when it is complete.
- c) Team Leaders have a primary responsibility on the quality of performance of their respective teams. The focus should be on operational performance.
- d) Frequent introduction of new methodologies and tools can negatively impact the quality, would be it more beneficial to slow down and have time to reflect and assess the performance, identify the gaps, analyse them and move forward the improvement of performance through training and other activities?
- e) Should performance be measured by a number of lives saved vs lives not saved?
- f) Countries embracing the GA resolution 57/150 should have a commitment to provide facilities and services to receive assistance, it is hard to have quality delivery if a country is not prepared to receive it. This could be discussed at the policy level.
- g) Importance of understanding affected countries' national response plans before arriving and starting rescue operations.
- h) Some teams have no resources (time, funds, etc.) to keep the quality high.
- i) It would be worth to have a paper demonstrating what should be prioritized as part of quality assurance. Space should be given at ISG to discuss that.

7. Break-out discussions (Round 2): Feedback 2015 Guidelines and discussions on 2020 version

Sebastian fom the Chile team shared about the team's 2 year IEC journey, and the rewards and challenges for a team throughout the IEC journey.

11. Plenary discussion: Suggestions and future of INSARAG Working Groups

Working Group Chairs/Representatives and Secretariat

Discussions on one working group and composed of relevant regional experts with the 5 core USAR functions i.e. Management, Operations – Technical Search, and Rescue, Medical and Logistics, be considered. Should further technical details be required, sub groups can be proposed.

The current working groups have supported the work of INSARAG well, and have already tasks going into 2018. The ISG will be consulted and feedback from the regional Chairs, if this works for member states supporting their members in this work.

12. Development of Team Leaders Meeting Summary and Closing Statements,
